#### **Background information**

The Prime Minister announced on 27 November the temporary introduction of new measures as a result of the Omicron variant and on 8th December that **Plan B**, set out in the autumn and winter plan 2021, was being enacted. As a result, these measures are reflected in this updated **RA 029B Contingency Plan COVID 19- Plan B v6 2<sup>nd</sup> January 2022**. This advice remains subject to change as the situation develops.

The **DfE Contingency framework**: education & childcare settings guidance was updated 15<sup>th</sup> December 2021. The contingency framework describes the principles of managing local outbreaks of Coronavirus (COVID-19) (including responding to variants of concern) in education and childcare settings, covering:

- the types of measures that settings should be prepared for
- who can recommend these measures and where
- when measures should be lifted
- how decisions are made

# Updated Plan B Changes 14<sup>th</sup> January 2022

All education and childcare settings should already have contingency plans (sometimes called outbreak management plans) describing what they would do if children, pupils, students or staff test positive for COVID-19, or how they would operate if they were advised to reintroduce any measures described in this document to help break chains of transmission.

COVID-19 resilience and planning is now more important than ever. Settings do not need to reformat their existing contingency plans to specific templates, but the plans should be kept robust and up to date in light of the advice set out here. A good plan should cover:

- roles and responsibilities
- when and how to seek public health advice
- details on the types of control measures you might be asked to put in place

For each control measure you should include:

- actions you would take to put it in place quickly
- how you would ensure every child, pupil or student receives the quantity and quality of education and support to which they are normally entitled
- how you would communicate changes to children, pupils, students, parents, carers and staff

This risk assessment applies to:

• special schools, special post-16 providers and alternative provision


